

Nez-Perce Clearwater Forest Plan Comment Guide

Comments accepted through April 20, 2020

Here are key points to include in your comments to the Forest Service about the revised Nez Perce-Clearwater Forest Plan:

- The Great Burn is one of the largest roadless areas in the Lower 48. It is
 outstandingly wild and provides critical habitat for wildlife including but not limited to
 mountain goats, wolverines, lynx, and dispersing grizzly bears.
- This plan should protect the wilderness values of this area to maximize future potential for wilderness designation. The entire 151,874-acre area should be recommended as wilderness in the final plan.
- Snowmobiling is known to have adverse effects on mountain goat populations and
 the populations in the Great Burn deserve protection. The revised forest plan should
 not open any of the Great Burn to winter motorized access. This map depicts the
 areas the Forest Service has proposed opening to winter motorized access in the
 Great Burn. (Another study: Mountain Goat Population Changes in Relation to Energy
 Exploration Along Montana's Rocky Mountain Front)
- Kelly Creek and its three forks (north, middle, and south), as well as Cayuse Creek, in The Great Burn should be recognized as suitable for Wild and Scenic River status.

Don't hesitate to share your personal stories and experiences in the Great Burn in your comment to the Forest Service. Be as specific as possible, and share how the decisions made in this plan will impact you.

If you'd like to include recommendations about other wild places beyond the Great Burn in your comments, watch this video from the Idaho Conservation League. There are quite a few special rivers and landscapes on this forest.
